WHY THE UNITED KINGDOM WITH CLASSICAL MOVEMENTS

Explore the land of John Milton, Shakespeare, Henry Purcell, Benjamin Britten and Vaughan Williams. The United Kingdom is a constitutional monarchy with a royal family, comprised of **England, Northern Ireland, Scotland, Wales**, and the Crown Dependencies of the **Isle of Man** and the **Channel Isles**. The UK today is a diverse patchwork of native and immigrant cultures, possessing a fascinating history and dynamic modern culture, both of which remain hugely influential in the wider world. Although Britannia no longer rules the waves, the UK is still a wonderfully historic, diverse, and beautiful destination.

Highlights: Buckingham Palace, Piccadilly Circus, Westminster Abbey, Cambridge and Oxford Universities, Edinburgh Castle, Stonehenge, and Belfast Castle.

History: The union between England and Wales began in 1284 with the Statute of Rhuddlan. It was formalized under Henry VIII with "The Laws in Wales Act" in 1536. In another Act of Union in 1707, England and Scotland agreed to permanently join as Great Britain, more than 100 years after the Union of the Crowns in 1603 when James VI of Scotland inherited the English throne. The union of Great Britain and Ireland was implemented in 1801 with the adoption of the title "The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland". 1921 formalized a partition of Ireland; six northern Irish counties remained part of the United Kingdom as Northern Ireland. The current title, "The United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland," was adopted in 1927.

Shopping: Great British souvenirs include: porcelain tea sets, English tea, woolens, linens, crystal glassware, tartan plaid, high fashion, Cadbury chocolates, Scotch whisky, Irish whiskey, and gin.

Food: Despite jokes and stereotypes, British food is actually very good and high quality. Popular British dishes include: fish and chips (deep-fried, battered cod, served with French fries/chips, and often dressed with malt vinegar), black pudding (a sausage made of congealed pig's blood, cornmeal, and various seasonings), Cornish pasty (beef and vegetables baked in a folded pastry case), Eccles cake (flaky-pastry cake with raisins), haggis (mixture of sheep innards, minced meat and oatmeal boiled in a sheep's stomach), Sunday dinner/roast dinner (Traditionally eaten on a Sunday, the meal consists of a roasted joint of meat and roast potatoes and steamed/boiled vegetables and Yorkshire pudding), pork pies, scones and clotted cream, sausage rolls, and Welsh cakes (scone-like cakes studded with raisins and dusted with sugar). Due to its large population of Indian immigrants, and the fact that India was once part of the British Empire, England boasts some of the world's best Indian food. The popular "Indian" dish, chicken tikka-masala, was actually invented in England.

Drink: Tea is a quintessential part of British culture. Tea is traditionally drunk at 4pm daily with a small snack such as **biscuits** (cookies), **scones**, or even savory items such as small **tea sandwiches.** For a pick-me-up, visit one of Britain's **pubs** and try a pint or half-pint of **British ale, lager, hard cider,** or **scrumpy** (a type of cloudy English cider). **Scotch whisky, Irish whiskey, single malt Welsh whiskey,** and **gin** are the four "national liquors" of the UK. **Pimm's** is also a popular British liqueur, made from gin, spices, and citrus fruit, and often mixed with sliced fruit or vegetables.



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ENGLAND

London: A vast and diverse metropolitan region to itself, the capital city of both England and the United Kingdom, a global capital of finance, fashion, and culture. Visit Buckingham Palace, the official home of the Queen, which is open for tours during the summer months. Also be sure to see the London Eye, St. Paul's Cathedral, Tower Bridge, the Tower of London, Big Ben and the Houses of Parliament, Piccadilly Circus, Trafalgar Square, Westminster Abbey, and the tallest building in the EU, The Shard.

Bath: Located in the West Country of England, Bath is famous for its Georgian and Victorian architecture, street art, cider, and the world famous **Roman Baths.**

York: an ancient cathedral city with a history that dates back to before Roman times. Visit the York Minster Cathedral, the ruins of St. Mary's Abbey, King's Manor, Eboracum Legion Bathhouse, York Dungeon, and take a walk atop the ancient city walls.

Cambridge is a gorgeous, green, university city located in the county of Cambridgeshire. Often regarded as one of the most beautiful cities in the world, Cambridge is home to the University of Cambridge, which includes the beautiful King's College and King's College Chapel, Queen's college and its Mathematical Bridge, Trinity College, St. Johns College, Corpus Christi College, as well as many other semi-independent colleges.

Oxford is the oldest university city in the United Kingdom, and is located 50 miles west of London in the county of Oxfordshire on the rivers Thames and Cherwell. Colleges of Oxford University include Worchester College, and Christ Church College, among others. Medieval churches and colleges dominate the bustling modern town and add an air of romanticism to the city. Picturesque architecture and a vibrant modern life set in the rolling Magdalen College countryside of Oxfordshire make this city a great destination.

SCOTLAND:

Edinburgh: As the capital city of Scotland, Edinburgh combines medieval relics, Georgian grandeur and a powerful layer of modern life with contemporary avant-garde. In Edinburgh, medieval palaces rub shoulders with the best of modern architecture, Gothic churches with amazing museums and galleries. Both Old Town and New Town of Edinburgh are listed as UNESCO World Heritage Sites. Visit Edinburgh Castle, Craigmillar Castle, the Abbey and Palace of Holyroodhouse, St. Giles' Cathedral, the houses of Scottish Parliament, the Scott Monument, and the Royal Botanic Garden.

Glasgow: The largest city in Scotland, Glasgow is located at the west end of Scotland's Central Belt on the banks of the River Clyde. In 2008, Glasgow joined the cities of Seville and Bologna in being named a UNESCO City of Music. Visit the Theatre Royal Glasgow, Glasgow Cathedral, Glasgow Cross, George Square, and the City Chambers.

WALES:

Cardiff, the capital city of Wales, is on the south coast of the south Wales plain, with a shoreline on the Bristol Channel. Visit Cardiff Castle, the Millennium Stadium, the futuristic Millennium Centre, the



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Norwegian Church, Llandaff Cathedral, Castell Coch, Beaupre Castle, Caerau Castle Ringwork, Penmark Castle, and Cathays Park.

Swansea is located in on the south coast of Wales. Due to its coastal location, Swansea was once a medieval market town and port. It is also the UK's first designated "**Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty.**" There are many museums and parks to visit within the city, as well as beautiful landmarks to see, such as **Swansea Castle**, the **Guildhall**, **Arther's Stone**, **Oystermouth Castle**, and **Mumbles Pier**.

NORTHERN IRELAND:

Belfast, the capital of Northern Ireland, is located at the mouth of the Lagan River on Belfast Lough. Visit Belfast Castle on Cave Hill, the Stormont Parliament Buildings, St. Anne's Cathedral, shop along Royal Avenue, and see the world renowned Political Murals throughout Falls Rd. and Shankill Rd.

Derry (or Londonderry): Situated on the banks of the River Foyle, Derry is the second largest city in Northern Ireland and one of the oldest inhabited places in the whole island of Ireland. Derry is the only remaining completely intact walled city on the island of Ireland and one of the finest examples of a walled city in Europe. St. Columb's Cathedral, the Apprentice Boys Memorial Hall, and the Derry Courthouse are some of the historic buildings within the walls. There are also many museums to visit, such as the beautiful Guildhall, the Tower Museum, and the Free Derry Museum.

Neighboring Countries: Ireland, France, Belgium, the Netherlands

PERFORMANCES AND CULTURAL IMMERSION

Venues include the Canterbury Cathedral, Royal Albert Hall, St. Anne's Cathedral, King's College Chapel, Llandaff Cathedral, and Christ Church Cathedral.

Symphony orchestras include the London Philharmonic, English Chamber Orchestra, Scottish Chamber Orchestra, Cardiff Philharmonic, Cardiff University Symphony Orchestra, and the New Belfast Sinfonia.

Many festivals are held in the United Kingdom each year, including the Edinburgh International Festival, Edinburgh Fringe Festival, London International Choral Festival, Oxford Leider Festival, Bath International Music Festival, Belfast Festival, and the Proms.

Cultural and musical exchanges with local ensembles, workshops and master classes with expert clinicians and outreach concerts to local schools and non-profit organizations are also available.
