

In June and July, the Yale Alumni Chorus went on a 25 day tour to South Africa. The choir visited Johannesburg, Game Parks, Port Elizabeth, Grahamstown, and Cape Town. During the course of the tour, the Chorus shared the *power of song* onstage with over 750 South African musicians.

In South Africa, the Yale Alumni Chorus held five formal concerts and participated in several musical exchanges. They performed two concerts with the Johannesburg Festival Orchestra & Symphony Choir of Johannesburg, one at the Linder Auditorium and the other at the National Arts Festival in Grahamstown. Drawing upon their own members, the Chorus made a magnificent donation of 110 instruments. The Eastern Cape Philharmonic Orchestra now has enough instruments for every child who wants to join their program.

Given their commitment to a broad program of outreach in the communities they visit, The Yale Alumni Chorus found that South Africa proved to be a particularly exciting destination.

Kansas was the site of the National Symphony Orchestra's 2007 American Residency – an annual program, unique to the NSO, in which the orchestra accepts the invitation from one of our nation's states to make that region the focus of a host of musical events. During the March 2007 Kansas tour, the members of the Orchestra participated in approximately 120 education and performance activities in all regions of the state. The NSO performed a total of six orchestral concerts, including a concert for young people plus dozens of educational and outreach activities and other events. Music Director Leonard Slatkin and Associate Conductor Emil de Cou led the orchestra in programs consisting of music by Copland, Schubert, Ravel, Beethoven, Gershwin, Mozart, Stravinsky, Brahms, Tchaikovsky and Wagner among many others.

The American Residency is one of the signature projects of the National Symphony Orchestra and NSO Executive Director Rita

Shapiro states "Music Director Leonard Slatkin, Associate Conductor Emil de Cou, and the members of the Orchestra all give extensively of their many talents during the Residency, and are richly rewarded, in turn, by all that we learn


# Yale Concert Band Blows Away Brazil


The performing itinerary included an appearance at the Centro de Convivencia

Rich in culture, history and a musical wealth of its own, Italy was a popular destination for several of Classical Movements' clients in 2007. The Pacific BoyChoir, The Yale Glee Club, The Winston-Salem Children's Chorus and The Smith College Chamber Singers were among the many groups that traveled through the country's famed cities, bringing their first-rate musical performances to audiences along the way.

The Pacific BoyChoir's concert tour in July of 2007 consisted of 11 concerts over 20 days, including appearances as part of **5 prestigious music festivals**. The choir also had the unforgettable experience of performing at an afternoon Mass at St. Peter's Basilica in Vatican City, plus an impromptu performance at the St. Francis Basilica in Assisi.

The boys stood in awe of the **medieval towns**, **castles**, and **ancient Roman ruins** as the choir visited such picturesque cities, towns and villages as Rome, Milan, Verona, Venice,

Soave, Vicenza and Bagnacavallo among many others.

The Yale Glee Club contracted Classical Movements to manage logistics for their concert tour of Italy in June of 2007. The talented ensemble marveled at such celebrated sights as the Sistine Chapel, the

ancient Roman Forum and Coliseum, Venice's spectacular St. Mark's Basilica, the Piazza San Marco, plus a viewing of Michelangelo's David in Florence.

was also able to add Mass at **St. Peter's Basilica** to their list of prestigious performances.



## Joie de vivre! - L'Orchestre National de France in London

Kurt Masur celebrates 80th birthday at the BBC Proms

L'Orchestre National de France and the London Philharmonic Orchestra joined forces for a very unique joint program at BBC's 2007 **Proms** in London. The occasion was a special one, not merely for the sheer size of forces on hand to perform Tchaikovsky's elegant Serenade for Strings and Bruckner's mighty Symphony No. 7, but for the fact that the celebrated maestro honored with the charge of leading this massive battalion was, himself, celebrating his birthday - his 80th to be exact.

On this extraordinary night, Kurt Masur, who held for years principal conductor positions with both ensembles, united the two groups into one colossal assembly that included an unprecedented 12 double basses, legions of brass and a sea of strings and woodwinds. The

result was an evening of music that proved to be not just a spectacular show of musical might, but also an artfully crafted display of poise, elegance and subtle nuance. From the masses, Masur successfully milked both triumph and pathos, and acoustically accomplished both the veritable fortified wall-of-sound as well as the poignant pianissimo required of the evening's repertoire.

The ecstatic crowd at **Royal Albert** Hall cheered their well-wishes to the birthday boy who, in turn, treated his admirers to an encore in the form of Wagner's Prelude to Die Meistersinger. Afterwards, the Maestro was honored by a reception at the French Embassy and awarded the medal of Grand Officier de la Légion d'Honneur. 💞

The tour was organized by acclaimed arts management agency Askonas Holt. Along the tour route, Classical Movements also played a supporting role in assisting Askonas Holt arrange the Russian artists' engagement at the Morton H. Meyerson Symphony Center in Dallas, as

well as individual performances for the Moscow Academy of Choral Art.

Hvorostovsky's performance offered an eclectic array of musical selections and styles from his homeland, including centuries-old Russian sacred works from the Christian Orthodox rite, opera arias, romances of pre-Revolutionary Russia, arrangements of Russian folk songs and even some Russian pop fare. Audiences delighted over the singer's lush, luxurious and resonant baritone voice as well as his exquisite interpretation. The November 2007 tour was Classical Movements' second opportunity to work with the celebrated Russian vocalist.

At the end of June of 2007, the Philadelphia Youth Orchestra, under Maestro Louis Scaglione, set out on a travel adventure to Brazil that would prove to be a crowning moment in the early musical careers of the ensemble's talented members. The concert tour led the orchestra through a number of Brazil's beautiful cities, including Sao Paulo, Rio de Janeiro and the town of Petropolis.

Among the performance venues were the Teatro Cultura Artistica in Sao Paulo and the stately Rio Teatro Municipal. Concerts were warmly, even enthusiastically received with repertoire consisting of Mozart's Overture to La Clemenza di Tito, the Overture from Handel's Music for the Royal Fireworks, Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 2, Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 ("Eroica"), Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto and the Schumann Piano Concerto.

Orchestra members thrilled to the breathtaking sights of Brazil's famous scenery and took delight in cultural exchanges with students of one of Rio's famous samba schools. The young artists of both organizations shared demonstrations of their respective craft, and when language became a stumbling block, it was to music and laughter that the teenagers turned to bridge the divide.

The Philadelphia Youth Orchestra's Brazilian tour serves as a shining example of the inestimable value of such a trip. Amidst a complicated world climate, there has perhaps been no better time for musicians of all ages to take upon themselves the role of global ambassadors of goodwill. Through music, artists everywhere are able to forge international bonds and build bridges of cultural understanding and unity - deeds that often elude the best-laid plans of politicians.

### Portland Youth Philharmonic Tours Taiwan and South Korea

America's First Established Youth Orchestra "Dreams Big"

For the musicians of the Portland Youth Philharmonic - America's First Established Youth Orchestra, July of 2007 was a month they will likely never forget as the talented ensemble embarked on an extraordinary concert tour that took them to Taiwan and South Korea. As for the scope of the trip, the numbers are very telling - 19 days, 4 cities, 6297 miles from home, 6 performances, 5 staff members, 12 chaperones, 81 musicians and 16,203 pounds of instruments. Certainly an ambitious undertaking, yet with Classical Movements handling the complex logistics of such a trip, the musicians were allowed to fully enjoy the wonderment of the journey and give undivided devotion to their music.

"Dream Big!" was the message early in the trip in Taiwan as PYP Music Director **Mei-Ann Chen** regaled the young musicians with stories of her childhood growing up mere blocks from the concert hall in which they sat, and shared tales of how she would practice conducting on her





The Minnesota Orchestra has recently been causing the music world to sit up and take notice, and the Orchestra's appearance at Carnegie Hall on February 13<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> of 2007 was an opportunity for New York audiences to share in the wealth of quality music making that Minnesota residents have been enjoying lately. The first evening of their New York engagement, Music Director Osmo Vänskä paired Beethoven's Fourth Symphony with Sibelius's Fifth; followed the next evening by Sibelius's Fourth Symphony opposite Beethoven's Fifth. A smaller work by Sibelius opened each concert.

Though many New Yorkers were heard joking that the Minnesotans had brought with them the cold temperatures outside, the Orchestra's performances inside the hall were warmly received.

Classical Movements has enjoyed an affable, productive and successful working

relationship with The Minnesota Orchestra over the years, and looks ahead to future projects together with eagerness and enthusiasm.

Orchestra and conductor together have generated quite a buzz in the music world of late, and the Orchestra's ongoing Beethoven Symphony Cycle on the BIS label - conducted

As for the audiences' take on the performances, their approval was easily recognized by the sight of patrons jumping to their feet, bursting into a frenzy of thunderous applause and bestowing on Dudamel and the orchestra the sort of fervent reception normally granted to rock stars.

The story of the Simón Bolívar Youth Orchestra is one of unmitigated success. The musicians, almost 200 strong and ranging in age from 12-26, are the crème of the crop of El Sistema, Venezuela's government-sponsored system of music education that reaches nearly 250,000 students. The program was founded by **Dr. José Antonio Abreu**. Many of the young musicians come from poverty, and many are not unfamiliar with the concepts of street gangs and other brutal realities of urban life. Instead, these young artists are now called "world-class musicians," tackling technically advanced literature, creating artistically superb music and bringing joy to the thousands for whom they perform.

Gustavo Dudamel, for his part, is perhaps the most talked-about conductor on the music scene today. At age 27, he is awaiting his scheduled appointment to the role of Music Director of the Los Angeles Philharmonic in 2009. CBS News' 60 Minutes called Dudamel "the hottest thing to hit classical music since Leonard Bernstein."


